## BRitish Columbia

IN describing British Columbia, one uses the conventioual expressions for the same reason that the cartographer uses his conventional signs, not because they really convey the idea, but simply because they are the common currency. The more one sees of British Columbia the stronger is its fascination, the readier one is to enthuse, almost to rhapsodize, over its lavishness, its lush richness, its infinite charm and variety. Wonderful scenery, good sport, 20,000 miles of good roads, and excellent accommodation combine to make a holiday in British Columbia an experience to be anticipated with eagerness, realized with zest, and remembered for long afterwards with genuine pleasure.

## VANCOUVER ISLAND

VANCOUVER ISLAND is the show-room of British Columbia. Scenically and industrially it is a complete compendium. Rivers, lakes, mountain-peaks, glaciers and snow-fields, forests, parks and ocean beaches-all are represented. Mixed and dairy farming, fruit growing, poultry raising and seed and bulb culture all thrive lustily in the southern portion. Logging and lumbering in all its phases is general, with mining on a large scale around Ladysmith, Nanaimo and Cumberland. Offshore are important commercial fisheries. The Island abounds in all sorts of game, furred, finned and feathered. The Island Highway is the main artery, but the more populous portion of the Island is well covered with scenic routes, along which are strung a series of pleasant little towns and villages, where accommodation is excellent.

## VICTORIA

Victoria, the Capital City of British Columbia, is situated in Saanich Peninsula at the southern end of Vancouver Island. It is an all modern residential city of some 65,000 inhabitants and is often called a 'little bit of England on the shores of the Pacific.' It is reached by fast automobile ferry steamers from the mainland ports of Anacortes, Bellingham, Edmonds, Port Angeles, Seattle, Steveston and Vancouver city; the steamers from Anacortes and Steveston land their passengers at Sidney, 18 miles by paved road from Victoria. The trip from the mainland takes from 2 to 4 hours according to the route followed. The Salt Spring Island ferry plies between Fulford Harbor and Swartz Bay at Sidney.

Victoria is the main gateway to Vancouver Island, good auto roads radiating from the city west and north. The chief attractions in and near Victoria are the majestic Parliament Buildings containing museums and archives; Mr. Butchart's Sunken Gardens, 'Sixteen Acres of Fairyland'". the old World residential section with its innumerable private gardens large and small; the 65 -mile Marine Drive; the Dominion Government Astrophysical Observatory housing the second largest telescope in the world; the Malahat Mountain Drive rising to 1250 feet above the sea; Mrs. Pendray's Gardens, containing remarkable specimens of topiary work and the quite exceptional views of snow capped mountains and island studded sea-scapes to be obtained from Beacon Hill Park and other points of vantage.

## SOOKE

On the Island Highway, near the famous Colwood Golf Course, an excellent paved road leads off to the West Coast of the Island.

At a distance of twenty-one miles from Victoria is found the village of Sooke, situated on Sooke Harbor, an almost land-locked body of water of great expanse and surrounded by wooded hills. The road passes through a most picturesque country and alternate routes are found via the Kangaroo, Happy Valley and Metchosin Roads.

A farming, fishing and lumbering settlement, the earliest settled district in British Columbia. Is a popular resort, enjoying the ocean breezes sweeping in from the open sea. Some of the heaviest stands of timber in the province are to be found in this vicinity. Extension of the road along the west coast will open up much fine scenery over a large area. Many miles of trail have been cut by private enterprise, affording enjoyable trips for which horses are available. Deep-sea fishing trips can be made from here and cannery fish-traps can also be visited. There is a large private school in the district. At Jordan River, 19 miles farther, are extensive hydro-electric developments.

Leaving Victoria via the Island Highway the road follows the waters of the Gorge, the upper reaches of Victoria Harbor. At a distance of eight miles the Royal Colwood Golf Course is passed, one of the most picturesque spots to be seen. A short distance further on is Langford Lake and Goldstream, and then the famous

## MALAHAT DRIVE

A scenic drive forming part of the Island Highway, between Goldstream and Mill Bay, a distance of 14 miles, rising to 1250 feet 8 miles from Goldstream. It runs in sight of Finlayson Arm and Saanich Inlet, from the summit affording a magnificent view across a smiling farming country, with the Gulf of Georgia and the Gulf Islands beyond and a background of snow-clad mountains on three sides. Near the summit a cross-road connects with the old Nanaimo Road at Shawnigan Lake. There is a Government camp-site off Finlayson Arm Road, which leaves the highway about 1 mile north of Goldstream, and there are several tea-rooms and filling-stations along the Drive, where meals, supplies and gasoline may be had.

## SHAWNIGAN LAKE

A settlement on the lake of the same name, about 20 miles north of Victoria, site of numerous summer homes of citizens of the capital. There are no public facilities, but camping-space can be found by arrangement with private owners.

## MILL BAY

A settlement at the northern end of Malahat Drive. A ferry service between here and West Saanich Road at Verdier permits of a circuit being made, taking the Malahat Drive one way and Saanich peninsula.

## MILL BAY FERRY SERVICE

Mill Bay terminal $251 / 2$ miles from Victoria on Osland Highway.

Brentwood Terminal $121 / 2$ miles from Victoria via Quadra Street and West Saanich Road.

The city is the administrative centre of the County of Nanaimo, with Government offices and court house, and it is one of the assize towns of the province. ## CAMERON LAKE, ALBERNI, PORT ALBERNI <br> The West Coast of Vancouver Island Calls You

If you want a real thrill, leave the Island Highway at Parksville, when driving north from Victoria or Nanaimo, or at Qualicum Beach when returning from the north, and turning west head for the West Coast.

Passing beautiful Cameron Lake, nestling at the foot of Mt. Arrowsmith, the Beaufort Drive plunges into a stand of mighty timber which almost shuts out the sun, and after winding through this impressive aisle, climbs by easy grade over the summit of Beaufort Range and drops to the twin cities of Alberni and Port Alberni.

From here the delights of fishing, golfing, hunting and hiking find endless scope, and every accommodation and facility for the tourist is to be found. The Big Interior tempts the more adventurous. For those who like a water trip, fast motor ships ply between the West Coast communities by way of the Alberni Canal, a natural inlet from the Pacific 24 miles long, and Barkley Sound. Ucluelet and Tofino can be found at either end of famous Long Beach with its miles of clean, hard sand, some day to be connected with the highway system by road.

Near the Albernis, Sproat Lake and numerous streams offer fishing, bathing, boating and all forms of outdoor sport and recreation. Alberni has fertile farms and unsurpassed gardens; Port Alberni has its big sawmills and fishing industries; every day offers new wonders and delights.

Camps and resorts are well equipped, and transportation facilities of all forms are available between parts of the West Coast district and other parts of the Island and mainland. Every courtesy will be extended those who would like further information if they will write to West Coast Vancouver Island Association, Box 367, Port Alberni, B. C.

## QUALICUM BEACH

Continuing along the highway beyond Parksville the motorist comes to Qualicum Beach, admitted to be one of the finest spots in British Columbia, not only as a place to spend a holiday, but owing to its equable climate and low rainfall of 35 inches per annum, a delightful place to reside in throughout the year.

Qualicum Beach, situated on the East Coast of Vancouver Island, 108 miles from Victoria and 3 hours from Vancouver City via Nanaimo, is one of the most popular holiday resorts on the Pacific Coast. From Qualicum there are good motor roads leading to all the most interesting parts of the Island. Really warm sea water bathing and two miles of hard, sandy beach. There are good train and stage services to Victoria and other parts of the Island, and to Vancouver City via Nanaimo by auto ferries and passenger steamers.


Good fly fishing can be had within a few miles of Qualicum Beach Hotel.

No better salmon fishing is to be found anywhere than in the bay, right in front of the hotel.

Power boats, in addition to numerous rowing boats, are available.

As for amusements, there is something to suit everyone. ## COURTENAY AND COMOX VALLEY

North from Qualicum Beach the highway continues and passes by Qualicum Bay and Royston where excellent beaches are to be found as well as accommodation for the holiday maker. Four miles beyond Royston and 145 miles from Victoria the Comox Valley is reached-a community where argriculture, lumbering and coal mining are extensively followed.

The centre of the community is the city of Courtenay, and a short distance from the main road on Comox Bay is the village of Comox, which offers many attractions for the holiday maker. Fishing, bathing, tennis and golf may be enjoyed here as well as excellent accommodation.

One of the interesting sights in Courtenay is the Native Sons hall, built entirely of cedar and fir logs. Reached from Courtenay is a lately opened wonderland known as the "forbidden plateau," from the circumstance that the Indians tabooed approach to it. This area is about 20 miles west of Courtenay, adjoining Strathcona Park, and is portion of the park game reserve. It is reached through Bevan to which there is a good motor road, and thence by trail. On the plateau numerous trails have been blazed by the Alpine Club. Within the area are Mounts Albert Edward ( 6968 feet), Alexandra ( 6394 feet), Washington ( 5415 feet), and Beecher ( 4500 feet). The plateau is rolling land at a general elevation of 3800 to 4000 feet, covered with white and purple heather and small firs, and is readily traversed on horseback. Many lakes dot the plateau, including Lakes Beautiful, Moat, Circle, Panther, Goose, Harris and Divers; and Oyster, Cruikshank and Brown Rivers take their rise here. The glaciers in Strathcona Park appear but a stone's throw distant. This plateau is destined to bocome a very popular resort and is admirably adapted for winter sports, its convenience of access being as it is.

Saddle horses may be had at Courtenay or Comox for trips to the Forbidden Plateau.

## CAMPBELL RIVER

Passing on to the north the motorist comes to Campbell River, a settlement near the northern end of the Island Highway, 175 miles from Victoria, and on the east coast of Vancouver Island. Port of call for coasting steamers. Striking falls some 500 feet high are to be seen about $11 / 2$ miles off the main road on the way to Forbes Landing (9 miles), the end of the road and entrance to Campbell and Buttie Lakes and Strathcona Provincial park and game reserve, an area of 800 square miles. Falls capable of developing 75,000 horsepower. Noted for salmon fishing at the mouth of Campbell River and adjacent waters. A 70 -pound salmon caught with rod and line is the record. The gold, silver and bronze buttons of the "tyee club"' are greatly prized by anglers who have fished here.

All necessary horses and equipment for trips to Upper Campbell Lake and Strathcona may be had at Forbes Landing as well as boats and fishing tackle. Campbell River is the headquarters of the Tyee Club of B. C., the membership of which includes many of the world's most noted anglers.

## VANCOUVER

## Canada's Evergreen Playground

VANCOUVER, British Columbia, is situated on the rugged coast line of the mid-Pacific Ocean, between the delta of the Fraser River and Burrard Inlet, a natural land-locked harbor, with a background of the forest-clad mountains of the Coast Range.

It is Canada's Western Gateway, and third largest city in the Dominion. It is the northern terminus of the Pacific Highway, 1800 miles in length, Vancouver is also the western terminus of the Canadian National Railways and the Canadian Pacific Railway, northern terminus of the Great Northern Railway, and southern terminus of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway.

A city only forty-two years old, Greater Vancouver now possesses a population of 305,000 , a harbor land-locked and open the year round, with 55 berths for deep-sea ships, and a mecca for the tourist, becausa of its natural scenic beauty. The city is one of the finest industrial manufacturing centres on the Pacific Coast. Vancouver has an ideal climate, experiencing neither extremes in summer or winter. The thermometer rarely rises above 75 degrees.

A most enjoyable holiday can be spent in and around the city of Vancouver, where there is a great variety of places to go, of things to see and do. For instance, there is Stanley Park, a lovely sea-girt park on the margin of the magnificent harbor; Capilano Canyon with its famous suspension bridge thrown daringly across the deep ravine; Grouse Mountain; and a remarkably fine Marine Drive. Then there is the waterfront, dense with the shipping of the Seven Seas. In its facilities the city is completely metropolitan. For recreation there are splendid beaches and golf courses of established excellence. Scenically, it is most wonderfully attractive, in itself and in its setting. Apart from the city itself, in its immediate vicinity are a number of beautiful seaside resorts, all of which reward the visitor with delightful impressions of British Columbia's marvellous coastal scenery.

Leaving Vancouver the tourist may take either the Grandview Highway or the Pacific Highway (Kingsway) through the Municipality of Burnaby which is a thickly populated urban district, to New Westminster.

Steveston, which during the summer months forms the terminal of the Steveston-Sidney Ferry, may be reached either from Vancouver by way of Granville Street and Marpole, or from New Westminster along the north arm of the Fraser River.

Ladner, which is the centre of the prosperous Delta District, is at the end of the Ladner Road and may be reached either from New Westminster along thd Scott and Ladner Roads or through Marpole and crossing the south arm of the river at Woodward's Landing where a frequent ferry service exists.

South from Ladner on a good road is Boundary Bay, a popular summer resort, and Point Roberts, a tiny tip of the peninsula which is in U. S. territory.

THE agricultural metropolis of British Columbia, it is the gateway to the fertile Fraser Valley, a thriving agricultural district, beautifully located on the banks of the mighty Fraser River. It has the largest fresh water harbor in Western Canada, its waterfront becoming more and more a picture of modern port development. New Westminster is the place where 'Steel Meets Keel,' having direct terminal connections and facilities with all Canadian and American trans-continental railroads and the British Colum. bia Electric Railway. It is the shipping port to all world's markets and the assembly centre for British Columbia's agricultural, horticultural and industrial products. All motorists on the Pacific Highway, the Inter-Provincial Highway and the Trans-Canada Highway pass through the city centre on their way north, south, east or west. There are many spots of historic interest and great beauty in and around the city, which is the third largest in the province. On the river banks on both sides are located large woodproducts mills, terminal elevators, cold storage aold shipping plants as well as many large industrial and manufacturing establishments. On your way call at the Automobile Office for all information.

Leaving New Westminster the motorist crosses the Fraser River and proceeds via the Pacific Highway (see map 11) to Clayton (Fry's Corner) where the road divides, a branch going through Cloverdale, the centre of Surrey Municipality, a prosperous agricultural district, and on to Blaine where the Canadian-United States border is passed into Washington. This forms the main route to and from the United States, although there are other ports of entry along the Fraser Valley at Douglas, where the International Peace Arch stands, Aldergrove and at Huntington.

From the Pacific Highway, just north of Blaine, a road turns west to White Rock, where there is an excellent beach and very popular camping and picnic grounds. Further on the same road one reaches Crescent Beach which also offers excellent accommodation and facilities for recreation. A more convenient route to Crescent Beach, however, is by way of the Johnson Road from the Pacific Highway, or by way of Scott and McLellan Road.

## THE PEACE PORTAL

Douglas, B.C., Canada - Blaine, Wash., U.S.A.
This "'Peace Portal"' is the only one of its kind ever erected in the world. It rises majestically to a height of sixty-seven feet-plain, simple, yet inspiring. The work was started in July, 1920. One foot-wall is planted in Canadian soil and the other in the United States of America. With one-half the massive structure in each country, it stands as a doorway to peace. From flagstaffs embedded in the solid concrete roof two national emblems float gracefully to the same breeze.

PROCEEDING to the interior or for a trip along the south Pide of the Fraser River, the tourist will leave the Pacific Highway at Clayton and continue over excellent road through Langley Prairie, where a road turns north to old Fort Langley, the first settlement on the Mainland of British Columbia on the banks of the Fraser. Continuing from Langley Prairie along the main Trans-Provincial Highway or Yale Road, as it was known in former years, the towns of Aldergrove and Abbotsford are passed. These are located in a district where dairying and agriculture are carried on extensively. Beyond Abbotsford the Sumas Reclamation area is crossed. Here, in a short space of time, a lake bottom has been transformed into a successful farming area by dyking and draining operations carried out by the Provincial Government.

From New Westminster the tourist may follow the north W. bank of the Fraser River through Port Coquitlam, the agricultural district of Pitt Meadows, Port Haney, Ruskin, where a road connects leading to the hydro-electric power plant of the B. C. Electric Railwayt Co. at Stave Falls, through Mission, a most prolific small fruit country, the agricultural districts of Dewdney and Deroche, following on to Agassiz, and thence to Harrison Hot Springs. This route may also be approached from Vancouver by way of Hastings Street and Barnet Road through Port Moody.

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Really to see the great hinterland of British Columbia, one should take the Cariboo Road. The Cariboo Road was built originally by Her Majesty's Royal Engineers seventy years ago, when the discovery of gold brought its thousands to British Columbia from California, and even from far-off Australia. Recently this road has been modernized and brought into line with present-day traffic needs, but it is still redolent of the colorful 'sixties. The miles are marked by picturesque old road-houses, and the route is dotted with quaint little old-world towns. Hope, Yale, Boston Bar, Lytton and Lillooet-all were athrob with tumultuous life when fortunes were being panned from the sand-bars of the Fraser. Now that the famous old Cariboo Road of stage coach days is becoming available to the motor tourist, the Cariboo country is attracting thousands each year, and accommodation for the traveller of today can be found at convenient distances.

## REVELSTOKE

The Kicking Horse Trail Motor Highway has recently been completed, connecting up Golden with other points of interest in the Canadian Rockies, such as Lake Louise and Banff. The building of this road is a truly interesting story in itself. This road gives the motorist what is probably the most magnificent circle tour on the North American continent, a trip that once taken will never be forgotten. Just a mile west of Golden is the beautiful Swiss village of 'Edelweiss,'" well worth inspection, where the C. P. R. Swiss guides make their homes.

Another beautifully scenic section is from Kamloops to Merritt and Princeton, where the road for many miles skirts the picturesque Stump and Nicola Lakes.

## MERRITT

Merritt, the centre of the Nicola Valley, is the hub of the valley, which has a population of some 3000 . It is a day's run from Vancouver, skirting the world renowned Fraser Canyon, and about two hours' run from Kamloops. It is pleasantly situated in the angle formed by the Nicola and Coldwater Rivers. Cattle raising has been the chief industry, although mining and lumbering are also extensive undertakings. Fifty-eight miles south from IMerritt the tourist comes to the City of Princeton after passing through a delightfully scenic countryside.

## PRINCETON

A coal, copper and railway town in Similkameen Valley. Lumbering is also carried on to a considerable extent and there are many farms and cattle ranches in the neighborhood. At Allenby ( 4 miles south) is a concentrator where the Granby Consolidated Mining, Smelting \& Power Company handles annually over $1,000,000$ tons of copper ore from Copper Mountain. From Princeton as a centre many motor and horseback trips may be made to scenic spots, such as Hope Pass and the "sky-line"' trail.

A road from Hope to Princeton is now under construction and when complete will be one of the most popular tourist highways as well as being the completion of the southern route across the province.

## OSOYOOS TO TRAIL

A country of different character is found along the Trans-Provincial Highway from Osoyoos to Trail. While agriculture is practiced, mining is perhaps the chief activity. From Osoyoos the road follows the international boundary, passing Anarchist Mountain, Rock Creek, Greenwood, Grand Forks, Rossland and Trail. This is an intensely interesting district, having one of the early mining developments of the province. Mining is still active here and large quantities of a variety of ores are produced.

At Trail are located the very extensive smelting and refining works of the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company of Canada, Itd. Minerals recovered here are gold, silver, copper, iron, lead, zinc, tin, cadmium, antimony and bismuth. The company's research laboratories are among the greatest in the world. A recent extension of activities is the production of commercial fertilizer, triple superphosphates.

An excellent road exists between Trail and Nelson, passing by Bonnington Falls, where there is an extensive hydro-electric development.

## NELSON

NTELSON is the chief city in West Kootenay and is picturesquely situated on the south shore of the West Arm of Kootenay Lake. Through this arm the Kootenay River runs to join the Columbia a few miles below, after passing over Bonnington Falls, where is situated a power plant which supplies light and power through a great stretch of country. The city stands at an elevation of 1770 feet and is an exceedingly attractive place. Its commercial and financial interests are extensive, serving, as it does, au very large area. Nelson is the administrative centre of West Kootenay, Government offices and court house being here. Mining was originally the main industry, but while it has grown there has also developed a large business in lumbering, and many thousands of acres are profitably devoted to dairying, fruit growing and berries. Running south, the Nelson-Spokane Highway connects with the chief city in eastern Washington, 168 miles distant, focus of many United States highways.

A good road will be found from Nelson to Proctor and along Kootenay Lake to Kaslo. The motorist may continue from here through the interesting Slocan Mining country to New Denver and return to Nelson via Slocan Lake, where the road follows the lake shore most of the way.

## CARIBOO DISTRICT

PURSUING the Cariboo Highway further north the tourist is led into that mystic country that has produced millions in placer gold, with its legends of fortunes made over night and sometimes lost as quickly, where gold dust was the medium of barter, and where even in this day a few of the old timers still live, in the evening of their lives, preferring the solitude and friendship of their mountain streams and forests, that they know so well, to the hustle and hurry of modern times.

Beyond Clinton is Williams Lake, a real little cow-town. The stampede held here in midsummer is a regular epitome of life on the open range, and gains steadily in importance and popularity with the waning elsewhere of that picturesque phase. Farther on is Quesnel, a pretty place, an oldtimer gone modern, and from there a road branches off to Barkerville. At Quesnel, by the way, they show a really wonderful Indian canoe, 51 feet long, and hewn from one giant cottonwood by the Indians of Takla Lake. Barkerville is unique. The curtain drops upon the present and raises on the past as the visitor gazes at the old Theatre Royal and the Belle Union Dance Hall, and walks through the quiet streets once strident with life and the hot passions bred by the lust for gold. A delightful old town, an anachronism really, which one leaves with an odd reluctance.

## PRINGE GEORGE

TTHE Prince George of today is brightly modern, but as a settlement it dates back to 1808, and behind its smart modernity is a stirring story of the days of the fur brigades and the earlier pioneers. From there the route is through a series of towns and villages-Vanderhoof, Burns Lake and Smithers, to name a few-to Hazelton, "at the end of the road." There the visitor finds himself in a country rich in lore and legend, and tales of the long ago when tribe fought tribe with ruthless ferocity and extinction followed fast upon defeat. Nearby are Indian villages gaudy with totems, and the whole area is intensely interesting to students of primitive life and custom and the savage art of the aborigine.

FORT ST. JAMES is a settlement and Indian village located on the shores of Stuart Lake, 43 miles by automobile from Vanderhoof.

Stuart Lake is undoubtedly one of the beauty spots of Northern British Columbia and is a veritable sportisman's paradise, Rainbow trout up to 35 lbs. being fairly common. A memorable trip can be taken by canoe over 300 miles on the waters of the various lakes connected with Stuart Lake, broken by only two short portages.

Throughout the Cariboo and Northern British Columbia all classes of big game are readily obtainable, while the lakes and streams provide a thrill for the fisnerman. This country has rightly been named 'the Sportsman's Paradise.'

## CANADIAN CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

Foreign cars may enter Canada for pleasure purposes only, for a period of 60 days on a free permit. If the tourist wishes to remain for a period exceeding 60 days he may get an extension of 30 days, making a total period of 90 days on a free permit. If said tourists are desirous of remaining in Canada a period exceeding 90 days, then it is necessary to arrange with the Canadian Customs to bond the car. This will permit him to remain six months.

Extensions of tourists permits may be obtained by application to any Customs Officer.

Persons wishing to bring guns, rifles (not including revolvers or pistols) for use of tourist and imported by him for his personal use and actually in his possession at the time of his arrival in Canada, may be admitted without deposit. Such articles must be reported on the Entry Card with full particularg, such as description, value and the amount of duty and taxes properly payable thereon, for purpose of identification on report outwards under Custom supervision within six months.

Dogs and cats may be brought into Canada by tourists duty free.

Parties entering and returning from Canada may have with them only such baggage as are personal effects and wearing apparel in use by the person actually accompanying them, and for the immediate use and convenience of the journey.

Persons may enter Canada by one port and leave by another, if they so desire, without trouble or expense.

## UNITED STATES CUSTOMS REGULATIONS

Foreign cars may be entered to the United States for pleasure purposes duty free for a period of ninety days. If a longer stay is desired it is necessary to secure a bond as security for the export of the car or the payment of duty. A permit for six months will be given upon the execution of the bond.

Ninety-day tourist permits may be obtained at any port of entry. A Canadian export permit must also be secured.

Report to both Canadian and United States Customs and Immigration Officers when crossing the border.

## EXEMPTION FROM DUTY

All bona-fide residents of United States returning from a visit to Canada are entitled to exemption from duty on personal or household effects not exceeding $\$ 100.00$ in value per person acquired during and incidental to their visit to Canada, provided the trip is not made for the express purpose of making such purchases.

Two or more members of one family may pool their $\$ 100.00$ exemption towards the purchase of one object (for instance a family of four persons touring together may purchase and be exempt from duty on one fur coat valued at $\$ 400.00$ ).

Goods so purchased in Canada by American tourists and exempt from duty may, if desired, be shipped to the purchaser's address in the United States by freight, express or parcel post and still enjoy exemptions from duty providing the aggregate value of any goods taken with them and goods shipped does not exceed the amount of teir total exemption.

## EMERGENCY ROAD SERVICE AND TOWING

Emergency first aid, towing and the delivery of emergency supplies of gasoline, oil or water are provided members of the Automobile Club of B. C. practically everywhere in the province, within twelve miles in any direction from more than 100 automobile garages. This service is given to members-in most places-twenty-four hours every day in the year. These zones cover practically all the main travelled roads throughout the province. In the event of member requiring service outside the twelve-mile limit of the nearest designated garage, a special low rate will be made by the garages for servicing beyond the twelve miles.

This same service is available to members when travelling in the provinces of Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba through arrangements which have been made with the Alberta Motor Association, the Saskatchewan Motor Club, and the Manitoba Motor League. Call the nearest Official Garage.

## HOW TO OBTAIN YOUR FREE SERVICES

When calling for assistance give your name, address, membership card number, license number, make of car, location and nature of trouble.

When phoning a garage, please refer to garages listed and call the nearest one.

Please fill in and sign the club service slip presented to you by the garage, after receiving service. This is the authority the garage has for billing your club for the free service you have received.

## GAME LICENSES

## Non-Resident

General Firearms and Angler's License (to a non-resident to hunt big game and game birds, and to angle for fish), $\$ 25$; provided that such person shall in addition to the license fee pay the following fees in respect of each head of big game shot by him:

For each grizzly bear, moose, sheep, wapiti or caribou, $\$ 25.00$.

For each black or brown bear, mountain goat or mule deer, \$15.00.

For every deer of any other species, $\$ 5.00$.
Season Angler's License (for calendar year in which license is issued), $\$ 10.00$, or $\$ 1.00$ per day up to 10 days.

British Subject's Weekly Game Bird License (to a person not a resident, who is a British subject residing within the Dominion, to hunt game birds), $\$ 5.00$ per week.

## BRIEFS FROM B. C. MOTOR VEHICLE ACT

Drivers of motor vehicles must be in possession of a driving license. Always carry it with you and show it on demand of a police officer.
SPEED LIMIT-Always drive in a careful and prudent manner. No person shall drive a vehicle on any highway so as to endanger the life or limb of any person or the safety of any property.

Driving in excess of twenty males per hour in a city or municipality or thirty miles per hour in the country is considered evidence of driving in other than a prudent manner. The onus of proof that it is not driving to the common danger rests with the driver.
SCHOOL ZONES-Passing a school at more than fifteen miles per hour between $8 \mathrm{a} . \mathrm{m}$. and $5 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. on school days, is a serious offence.

STOP SIGNS-Full stop required wherever stop sign is displayed, and before entering arterial highways. Also required to stop and remain standing ten feet behind street cars while passengers are boarding or alighting, except where safety islands are provided.
PARKING on the main travelled portion of any highway is prohibited.

RIGHT-OF-WAY-At intersections vehicles from the right have the right-of-way, except on arterial highways.

MUFFLERS-Must not be cut out or disconnected.
SPOT-LIGHTS—Only one spot-light allowed on vehicle. Beam must strike the ground within 100 feet and to right of center of vehicle.
SIGNALS-Standard arm and hand signals for turns and stops. Gongs, sirens and whistles prohibited, except by police, firemen and ambulances.

STICKERS-or any other non-transparent material prohibited upon upper half of front windshield, side wings, side or rear windows of car.

WINDSHIELDS must be equipped with device for removing rain or other moisture.

ANIMALS being transported must be protected in such a way that they will not fall or be thrown from the vehicle.

CENTER LINE-Crossing center lines when overtaking another car, on a curve or narrow road, is dangerous as well as illegal. Keep to the right.
ACCIDENTS-Report all accidents immediately to the nearest police station.
